

SPAM POLICY

Last updated 11/20/2002

The following are some examples of spamming that may violate Wheatland Broadband's prohibition on spamming and unethical marketing activities:

- Manipulating identifiers, such as email headers, to disguise the origin of any content transmitted to or through Wheatland Broadband computer systems.
- Relaying email from a third party's mail servers without the permission of that third party.
- Using or causing to be used Wheatland Broadband computer systems to facilitate the transmission of unsolicited or unauthorized material. This includes any promotional materials, URLs, "junk mail," "chain letters," "pyramid schemes," or any other form of unauthorized solicitation that you may upload, post, email, transmit, or otherwise make available.
- Using "robots" or otherwise harvesting other's email addresses from the Wheatland Broadband site for purposes of sending unsolicited or unauthorized material.
- Uploading, posting, emailing, or transmitting the same message, URL, or post multiple times.
- Disrupting the normal flow of dialogue, or causing the screen to "scroll" faster than other users of the service are able to type, or otherwise acting in a manner that negatively affects other users' ability to engage in real-time exchanges.

Violations of this Spam Policy may result in legal action against you and the termination, without notice, of your Wheatland Broadband account and/or anything associated with it, including, but not limited to, email accounts, home pages, and profiles. Nothing in this policy is intended to grant any right to transmit email to or through Wheatland Broadband computer systems. Wheatland Broadband does not waive any rights by the failure to enforce this policy in every instance in which it might apply.

NOTICE: Sending unsolicited email advertisements to or through Wheatland Broadband computer systems will use or cause to be used Wheatland Broadband servers located in Kansas. Any unauthorized use of Wheatland Broadband computer systems is a violation of the Wheatland Broadband Acceptable Use Policy, Spam Policy, and certain federal and state laws, including the Computer Fraud and Abuse Act (18 U.S.C. § 1030 et seq.) and Section 21-3755 of the Kansas Penal Code. Such violations may subject the sender and his or her agents to civil and criminal penalties.
